Tine Damsholt is professor in European Ethnology at the Saxo-Institute, University of Copenhagen (UCPH). Her primary fields of research are everyday life and political culture i.e. material-discursive practices in contemporary and 18th and 19th century Denmark. She has an extensive experience as principal investigator and manager of qualitative and ethnographic research projects on everyday practices in contemporary Denmark within the fields of lockdown temporalities, university education, meals and grocery shopping, sustainability, green tourism, and involving perspectives of users, innovation, and transition. She has published extensively on national and patriotic discourses and rituals in 18th- and 19th-century Denmark-Norway and in contemporary Western countries based on cultural history and ethnographic fieldwork. Practice, temporality, subjectivity, materiality, discourses, emotions and affects, landscape, bodily movement, and gender are recurrent themes in her research and publications. She has authored numerous peer reviewed book chapters and research articles in leading international journals, she has co-edited several volumes, and is frequently invited as keynote speaker at international seminars and conferences, and as guest lecturer at European Universities.
